## Seasons of the Church

Most people have at least one calendar in their home where they keep track of appointments and special events, such as birthdays and anniversaries. Ours is hanging on a door in our kitchen. This is called a solar calendar because it keeps track of the earth's yearly trip around the sun.

Did you know that the Christian church has a special calendar too? We call it a liturgical calendar that relates to our worship services. Brookville Church calls them worship celebrations because each Sunday is a mini celebration of Jesus' resurrection. The liturgical calendar celebrates the cycle of events in the life of the Church which center on the life of Jesus Christ. The Church has a beautiful, yet mysterious rhythm to its seasons that renews us as we participate fully in them. Just as the calendar year follows the sun, so too the Church year follows the Son, the Son of God, Jesus Christ. Each season in the liturgical calendar has a corresponding color with the changing of the Church seasons.

The Bible starts out with God creating order out of chaos. *"Now the earth was formless and empty,* darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters." (Genesis 1:2) God communicates with us in ways we truly need. Time as it is so deeply felt by creation needs order to give it meaning, so the Church calendar brings meaning to our faith.

The First Sunday in Advent is the "New Year" for the Church. Advent is the season where we get ready for Jesus' birth. This year the first Sunday in Advent is November 28, 2021. The liturgical color for Advent is **Purple** because purple is considered the color of royalty and Christians believe that Jesus is our King. Advent is the four Sundays leading up to Christmas.

# **Sukkot – An Important Message for Our Time**

Sukkot, a Hebrew word meaning "booths" or "huts," refers to the Jewish festival of giving thanks for the fall harvest. It also commemorates the 40 years of Jewish wandering in the desert after the giving of the Torah atop Mt. Sinai. Sukkot is celebrated five days after

Yom Kippur on the 15th day of the month of Tishrei (this year corresponding to September 21st). Of all the holidays on the Jewish calendar, the one the Torah singled out most strongly for worldwide significance is Sukkot.

# **Opening Day at the Interfaith Community of Long Island**

There was amazing positive energy and love at our Open House! On September 19th, it was so exciting to have the opportunity to meet new families. It was wonderful to see our returning families as well.

At the Open House, our kids participated in their religious education classes, taught by both a Christian and Jewish instructor. New families were introduced to the leaders of the IFC and Cantor Irene filled the grounds of our Multifaith Campus with beautiful music and singing.

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#### Seasons of the Church

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The next season in the Church is the Christmas season. This is different from what stores call the Christmas season, which is Advent to us. The Christmas season comes just after Christmas. It is the time we celebrate the incarnation of Jesus coming down from heaven to take on human flesh. (See John 1:14) Unlike the solar calendar on all our smart phones and hanging on our walls, the Christian calendar considers both Christmas and Easter as seasons, not just individual days.

Twelve days after Christmas, but still during the Christmas season is Epiphany. This is when we believe the Wise Men came to visit Jesus. The Christmas season is very short. It ends just after Epiphany with Jesus' Baptism. So for the two Sundays of the Christmas season our liturgical color is White. It is white to symbolize purity. As Christians we believe that Jesus was pure and without sin.

The next season of the Church calendar is called Ordinary Time. It is not "ordinary" in our usual definition of the word. Remember how I said that God brought order out of chaos? The basis of calling this season in the church ordinary, actually refers back to that defining quality of God as the Divine Orderer of creation. This is the time in the Church year where we focus on our growth as Christians. Ordinary Time is not "ho-hum" time, instead it is a time to reflect on how God brings God's divine presence into the chaos of our lives. The color for this season is **Green**. Green is the color of growth. It is what springs forth after a long winter. It makes sense that the time in the Church year where we focus on growing in our relationship with God is green.

After Ordinary Time comes the season of Lent. Lent lasts 40 days not counting Sundays. Forty days corresponds with many events in the Bible.

- God made it rain on the earth for 40 days and 40 nights.
- Jesus enters the wilderness just after he was Baptized for 40 days. Jesus fasted and prayed, but he was also tempted by the devil during this

The season of Lent's liturgical color is **Purple**. Purple is also seen as a color of repentance. Lent is a time when we are to focus on what we need to give up that might be getting in the way of our love for God. Lent is the season leading up to the most important event in the Christian calendar: EASTER!

Easter is when we celebrate Jesus coming back to life after dying on the cross. Jesus breaks the power of sin and death by resurrecting from the dead. The color for the Easter season is White. This season lasts 40 days because this is the number of days Jesus is on earth after his resurrection. See how the number 40 is important to Christians?

During these 40 days, Jesus finds his disciples and proves to them that he is alive. Then Jesus tells his disciples that he must go to heaven but that he will send someone who will be with them always, someone to take his place which is the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit of God is able to be in more than one place at a time. Jesus was not able to do that because he was human. So the Holy Spirit can be with everyone on the planet all at the same time. In fact, the Holy Spirit lives inside each of us.

There is a special day in the Church year where we celebrate the Holy Spirit's power because it is the day that the Holy Spirit showed up. This day is called Pentecost. The liturgical color for Pentecost is Red. When the Holy Spirit came, the Spirit took on the shape of dancing fire! It is the only Sunday where the liturgical color is red.

After Pentecost we go back to Ordinary Time in the Church year again where we focus on our growth as Christians. This period lasts until the first Sunday in Advent when we start the whole Church year over again.

As we go round and round the liturgical calendar each year, may it draw us deeper and deeper into the mystery of the coming of Jesus Christ as a man and his offering of that life back to God. Let's recognize God's ordering power over the chaos of our lives and allow ourselves to be continually recreated as we offer our lives up to God.

Sukkot is marked by several distinct traditions. One tradition, which takes the commandment to dwell in booths literally, is to erect a sukkah, a small, temporary booth or hut. For thousands of years Jews have observed the Torah commandment to leave the comfort and security of their homes and eat in this specially constructed outdoor hut. In this year of coronavirus, this mitzvah no longer seems strange. There is so much in this world that we take for granted as if it were ours by automatic right or well-deserved reward. We complain about the things we lack and hardly ever take the time to thank G-d for the priceless favors and blessings bestowed upon us. The holiday of Sukkot is the

time to acknowledge the source of "the harvest" of our lives, the divine gifts that make our lives possible and pleasurable. Renew your strength and courage. Inspire yourself. Ignite the spark that lies within your soul.

Sukkot asks us to temporarily go outside. look around at G-d's creations. "dine out doors" with your family, in a sukkah from which you can gaze up, see heaven above and be reminded of G-d as well as your blessings. This has been a challenging time for all of us. Life is not always easy, but by remembering that there is something more, something that goes beyond our limited vision of the world, we can begin to get a glimpse of how G-d sees the bigger picture. HaShanah and Yom Kippur, might just be the one Jewish holiday that has the most to teach the entire world about the real meaning of happiness. These days, we need unity more than ever. Stop judging. Start loving. Call someone you know who is alone. Reach out to a friend. Give a good word, a smile. G-d grants us peace when there is peace amongst us. Seize the moment. Unity brings peace. Peace brings strength.

May the words recited at the end of reading each book of the Torah inspire you: Chazak, chazak, v'nitchazeik. "Be strong, be strong, and we will strengthen each other."



- 2. What is my shelter plan?
- 3. What is my evacuation route?
- 4. What is my family/household communication plan?
- 5. Do I need to update my <u>emergency preparedness</u> kit?
- 6. Check with the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and update my emergency plans due to Coronavirus.
